FIELD SERVICE UNIFORM

The various materials used for the purpose of Uniform are treated with a waterproofing process and thoroughly soap shrunk.

Prices quoted represent our charges for the best quality in materials and workmanship, and any recommendations are made in the light of recent experience and knowledge of how various materials have stood the test of the hard Winter's campaign.

SERGE

Khaki Serge in thin, medium and heavy weights may be considered the regular material for a Field Service Uniform. Slacks or trousers are always made in serge to match, but Knicker Breeches of Bedford Cord are generally worn with a serge jacket.

WHIPCORD

For hard and continuous wear a khaki whipcord is undoubtedly the material, presenting always a smart appearance and standing weather well. Most Regiments have adopted a whipcord in preference to serge for parade, but for other duties a serge is as suitable. A suit of each is recommended, and the cloths are made in three weights according to the Season.

BARATHEA

The Barathea Cloth (Guards' pattern) is very smart and comfortable in wear, and has become a most popular cloth. It has not, however, the exceptional wearing qualities of a strong whipcord.

CAVALRY DOE

If an extra heavy material is required, a Cavalry Doe is recommended. The cloth is the same as that used for Cavalry overalls, but naturally is in a khaki colour.
