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PROHIBITION KILLINGS

The Hoover crime commission's probe of liquor law killings struck a snag when the Department of Justice professed inability to determine the number of civilians and officers who have met death in prohibition enforcement and thereupon abandoned its inquiry. Atty. Gen. Mitchell explains that many states and municipalities cannot furnish a record of such deaths. Naturally the probers will not accept the highly conflicting estimates made by wets and dries.

The government's failure to obtain figures on those killed would indicate that many tear ducts opened by recent shootings were regulated by the viewpoint. The sensational way killings are played up by the respective sides is passing example of the art of propaganda. However, unwarranted shootings are back of Prohibition Commissioner Doran's ban against the use of rifles by federal dry agents except in sparsely settled or mountainous sections. Records at the Prohibition Bureau list **142 civilians killed by prohibition agents** as against **55 enforcement officers slain by rum runners**.
