HOLD THAT HEMLINE!**WOMEN REBEL AGAINST LONG-SKIRT EDICT**

A GITATEDLY charging that "browbeating Paris courtiers are leading us around by the nose," embattled U. S. and Canadian women rebelling against the sloping-shoulder long-skirt and padded-hip ukases, fought it out on the existing, 16½-inch-off-the-ground, two-inch-below-the-knee hem line, all last summer.

Roundly berated, also, was the National Retail Dry Goods Association for thrusting the unwanted, leg-concealing new modes on price-harassed consumers as a means of stimulating trade for the recession-fearing dress industry.

Sparked by plumpish, (ex-model) housewife Mrs. Warren Woodward (*see cut, below*) who organized 1,300 Dallas co. protestants as the first Little Below the Knee Club, the crusade rapidly gathered momentum.

Verbosely-titled similar clubs immediately became affiliated with the movement: the Women's Organization to Wear on Styles (WOWS), in California; the League for the Preservation of Longer Skirts for Women, in Toronto; the Lizzie Stone League for the Abolition of Long Dresses in Daytime

University of Kentucky's Veterans Club plunged into the campaign with a hopeful resolution calling on married vets to discourage their wives from buying new-style dresses, asking ex-GI bachelors not to date girls who did.

Opined U. S. Commerce Department's Economist Virginia Collier, when interviewed by Scripps-Howard's Daniel Kidney: "Women's style-changes occur in cycles. The present one seems revolutionary because it was long overdue. . . Few women ignore style changes. . . The new styles will be no exception!"
